Things That Are Lost Luke 15:4–32

May 30, 2021

CONNECT

1. Who did God use to lead you to Himself? Share one or two stories around the group.

CELEBRATE

2. The “least religious” people flocked to Jesus (Luke 15:1). Why? How do you think they perceived Jesus? Why were they so eager to draw near to Him?
3. The “most religious” complained that Jesus welcomed everybody. Why?
4. Read Luke 15:3–10. What does the shepherd feel toward the sheep? How does the woman feel when she finally finds her coin? What is Jesus teaching us through these parables?
5. What gives God joy (Luke 15:7, 10)? How focused are you on the thing that gives God such joy?
6. How would you describe the heart of the father in the parable of the prodigal son? Read Luke 15:20–24. What emotion fills the father’s heart? How does he express that emotion to the prodigal son? How does God the Father express that to you?
7. How does Luke 15:31–32 reveal the heart of the father to the older son? What emotion fills his heart? How does the father express that emotion to the older son? How does God the Father express that to you?
8. The prodigal was lost due to outright rebellion, while the older son was lost due to hardened pride. The father sought and saved both. What encouragement does this give us for those in our lives who are prodigals or proud?

CONTRIBUTE

9. Both sons doubted the father’s compassionate heart, despite his eager desire to love them. For both, their restoration depended on trusting their father’s heart for them. What do you believe that God feels toward you? Have you ever doubted His compassionate heart for you? How can we encourage each other with the Father’s love toward us? Take time to do so around your group.
10. If you spoke with someone who doubted the Father’s love for them, what would you say to let them know of His love? How can these three parables equip you with tools to describe the Father’s love? After discussing this, think of someone in your life who doesn’t yet know Christ. Pray for them. Make a plan to go to them this week and let them know of the Father’s love.
