The Persistent Widow Luke 18:1–8

June 20, 2021

CONNECT

1. Have you ever persistently prayed for something and seen the Lord come through with a tangible response? What was that like? How have you felt when it seemed God has not responded to your persistent prayers? In what ways has persistent prayer changed you, regardless of what God's responses seem to be?

CELEBRATE

- 2. Carefully read Luke 18:1–8. What tensions arise for you as you read through the text? Why? Talk about this among your group.
- 3. What could be Jesus' reason for frontloading the parable with the statement to pray and not lose heart? Why might this matter?
- 4. At first glance it could appear that the judge in the parable represents God, while the widow represents us. What common ground do the judge and God share and what are the points of contrast? Read 1 Peter 3:12 and Psalm 66:16–20 for further insight.
- 5. Zechariah 7:9–10 highlights what scholars call "the quartet of the vulnerable"—the widow, the orphan, the immigrant and the poor—exhorting that we must "administer true justice, show mercy and compassion to one another." In what ways might the widow in Luke 18:1–8 be vulnerable, provoking her cry for "justice against [her] adversary?" See Luke 20:45–47 for further perspective. How is God growing your sensitivity to the quartet of the vulnerable?
- 6. In Luke 18:5, the judge desires the widow no longer "beat me down" by her persistence. In the original language, the phrase is a boxing term where someone is beaten black and blue or given a black eye. What might this suggest about the fierce nature of the widow's persistence with the judge? How does this influence your own persistence in prayer?
- 7. What obstacles exist that keep you from being persistent in prayer? Process these together.

CONTRIBUTE

- 8. It is reasonable to assume that our persistence in prayer should reflect the heart of God. What matters are you relentless in prayer about before God, reflecting His heart and purposes? Share some with the group.
- 9. How are you praying—co-laboring with God—for those God may call to redemption and into kingdom citizenship? With what urgency are you talking with God and how might you develop that urgency, especially in light of Jesus' return (Luke 18:8)?
