DISCUSSION QUESTIONS

AUGUST 8, 2021

OUR HERO REDEEMS Psalm 103:4

Ice-breaker

1. Thinking about good books or cinema, share one or two exhilarating rescue stories. What makes them special to you?

Going Deeper

- 2. Carefully read Jonah 2:2–6 and Psalm 142. Note that these two men are in the throes of despair—in the proverbial pit of despair. What is your "pit" story?
- 3. When you find yourself in the pit of despair, how do you react? Do you employ earthly methods to reach for the top? Do you cry out to the God of glory for help? What influences which direction you go?
- 4. The text of Psalm 103:4 talks about our lives being rescued from the pit. What is it about our lives that should matter to us because it clearly matters to God? Why might we downplay or dismiss that?
- 5. Read Isaiah 53:4–6. Considering the price that Jesus paid to redeem us from the pit, how does that shape how you see the value of your own life? What does that price say about your value?
- 6. Read Colossians 1:12–14. If to redeem something is to purchase or buy, what does this text tell us we are redeemed from? Importantly, what does the passage tell us we are being redeemed for or to?

Action

- 7. What steps can you take with Jesus today to walk in the freedom bought for us by His blood?
- 8. According to Colossians 1:12–14, we share an inheritance with God's people, we become beloved kingdom citizens and we enjoy forgiveness for sins. How are we using these glorious gifts within the world around us?
