

CONNECTION Revelation 7:9–17

CONNECT

- 1. Name a group you've been part of that was the most unified and connected. What would you give as the reason that group "worked" or connected so well together?
- 2. What are some key components of Christian community when it is working the way God intends it to?

GOING DEEPER

- 3. Read Revelation 7:9–12. What stands out to you about the great multitude pictured in verses 9–10? Where is this scene taking place? What type of diversity is represented here? What unity do we see?
- 4. When the multitude cries out, how do the angels, elders and the four living creatures respond?
- 5. What do verses 10 and 12 reveal about God? What do these truths mean to you? How should the knowledge of this scene affect the way we live now?
- 6. Read Revelation 7:13–17. Look at verse 14. What did it cost God to secure these people for Himself? How do we spurn this sacrifice when we create divisions that God does not make?
- 7. What qualifies this white-robed crowd to stand before God? What is their new role? What is their future (the blessings promised to them) in verses 15–17?
- 8. How would this encourage the Christians of John's day? Of our day?
- 9. Compare verse 17 with Psalm 23 and John 7:37–38. How does this vision of the Lamb at the center of the throne fulfill the images described in Psalm 23 and John 7?
 - a. How does this picture of Jesus' authority bring comfort to your pain?
 - b. What are some of the things in our world that bring us to tears? Why is it comforting to know that one day God will wipe all our tears away?

ACTION

- 10. How has the gospel transformed you personally? How has it transformed the way you think about living in community with others?
- 11. How can we incorporate this glimpse of heavenly worship into our earthly walks this week?
